Time Out DUMBO - One Of The Best Places to Dine Outside in NYC

The "Food Market" concept proves to be a great success in New York City. In May 2019, the Time Out Market opened in Dumbo: and offers around 20 different vendors, 2 bars, a rooftop with an additional 4 restaurants. The food market in DUMBO on 55 Water Street is just as successful as its other chains such as the one in Lisbon. The absolute best thing about the location is the view from the balcony. It provides unobstructed views of the Manhattan skyline as well as the Manhattan and Brooklyn Bridge. So when you are looking for the best things to do in April check out this amazing spot – you will love it!!!



Visit one of New York's Amazing Art Exhibitions at MoMa PS1

Check out the local art scene in the MoMa Ps1 art exhibit, featuring work from 47 local, contemporary artists. This exhibit explores artmaking in New York history, the resilience of artists, and the feelings connected with art. You'll see a huge emphasis on foreign-born artists, their work full of Egyptian, Iranian, Tunisian, Nigerian, Mexican, Argentinian, and Indian influences. There is also an abundance of Native American artists to enjoy.







Visit Little Island at Pier

Not far from the Meatpacking District and the High Line, Little Island is one of the newest attractions in New York and is something very special: a park on 132 beautiful tulip-shaped concrete stilts in the Hudson River





Visit Governors Island

Though Governors Island is no longer a secret spot, it hasn't lost its charm and remains one of our favorite places in New York. Throughout the summer, visitors can enjoy breathtaking views of Manhattan from the island, ride bicycles, and participate in a large variety of events hosted here. Usually Governors Island closes at the end of October, in 2022 you check it out even during winter and spring! A ferry ride to the island typically costs \$3 but if you decide to come on a Saturday or Sunday before noon, it'll be free!

The Hare with Amber Eyes

The Jewish Museum

The namesake ivory rabbit of the celebrated memoir "The Hare with Amber Eyes" is among Japanese netsuke figures, artifacts, and photos chronicling the rise to prominence and splendor then subsequent decline of the central European Ephrussi family whose members acquired and preserved the collection of Japanese miniature carved sculptures subsequently bequeathing them to the author of the best selling book. *Closes May 15*

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Jacques Louis David: Radical Draftsman

Metropolitan Museum of Art Follow the evolution of the style of the great French artist and preparatory sketches of renowned paintings in an exhibit of works on paper which follow the great classicist to studies in Rome, depictions of the French Revolution and Napoleon's ascendency, and ultimately exile in Belgium.

Garments and accessories from the 1990's explore the fast-paced and sometimes incongruous nature of fashion trends at the end of a century and end of a millenium,a compelling period filled with hope for the future and yet fraught with anxiety. A Trillion Sunsets, A Century of Image Overload

International Center of Photography Addressing the concerns of artists and commentators troubled by the overload of images in the world, the exhibit employs scrapbooks, internet memes, collage, image appropriation, art made by algorithm to explore worries and compulsive fascination with the proliferation of photographic images. *Closes May 2*

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The Orchid Show: Jeff Leatham's Kaleidoscope

New York Botanical Garden

In this year's annual tribute to orchids, dazzling towers of orange, yellow, green, undulating fields of white, overhead plumes of purple created by famed floral designer Jeff Leatham transform the historic Enid A. Haupt Conservatory into a different color experience and visual effect like the turn of a kaleidoscope. *Closes May 1*



Projects: Kahlil Robert Irving

Museum of Modern Art Mining the internet as a living archive of Black life, death, remembrance, celebration, and survival, Irving's multimedia assemblages of images and sculptural replicas of everyday



objects, juxtaposed with a wallpaper frieze, depict what the artist calls "an everlasting feedback loop of my experience." *Closes May 1*
