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The NYC Marathon 2021

Everyone is required to wear masks on public transportation to the start, in the start area in Staten Island, in the post-finish area in Central Park, and in designated indoor venues. However, runners are not required to wear face coverings on the course. Everyone participating in the marathon are being required to have at least one dose of the COVD vaccine or proof of a negative test. Furthermore, the race will be modified to about 30,000 runners (That's about 60 percent of its usual participation). An extended range of wave start times will happen, with the first wave starting a half-hour earlier and later waves extending a half-hour later. An additional wave has been added, making a total of five waves.

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The Rink at Rockefeller Center

The Rink will be open daily from 9am until midnight, and if you've never closed down the rink for that last late night skate, 2021 should be your year. Admission prices range from \$20-\$54 per person depending on the date and time of day. Skate rentals are available for \$10. Local skaters can also purchase a membership to have access to the rink and unlimited skating throughout the season.

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An enormous new nightclub is opening near Times Square

If you're eager to embrace the raging '20s we were promised (and not the pandemic '20s we were given), an enormous new nightclub has your back. Nebula will bring a multi-level 11,000square-foot club to 135 W. 41st Street on Friday, November 5. With a capacity for 700 guests, Nebula will be the largest club to open in Manhattan in years. A 5,500-square-foot dance floor offers plenty of space to show off your moves, plus a mezzanine level and lower level with three private club rooms dedicated to private groups (complete with their own dedicated bathrooms) lets you customize your going out experience. Think: Over-the-top karaoke nights, a seated dinner for twenty or a small dance party with your closest friends.




Melvin Edwards: Brighter Days

Public Art Fund

Situated in City Hall Park Melvin Edwards' monumental stainless steel chains with broken fragments evoke the brutality of racism and slavery while the title "Song of the Broken Chains" adds a hopeful theme of redemption. Closes November 28

Andrew Edlin Gallery

A solo exhibit of the New Orleans artist known as "The Goya of the ghetto" features two dozen watercolors realistically depicting grisly life during the 1990's crack wars.

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Jules Tavernier and the Elem Pomo

Metropolitan Museum

Tavernier's 1878 masterwork "Dance in a Subterranean Roundhouse at Clear Lake, California" commissioned as a gift for Baron Edmond de Rothschild, is the centerpiece of an exhibit which explores the life and travels of the French painter and illuminates the resilience of the indigenous Elem Pomo peoples and highlights their continued cultural presence. Closes November 28

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Trudy Benson

Miles McEnery Gallery

Cables of thick paint and squiggly frenzied lines compose geometric shapes, stripes, nets, in Trudy Benson's abstract paintings. Among the first artists who painted on a computer before canvas, Benson references the past while also



positioning herself in a place to move and grow. Closes November 27
