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St. Patrick's Day Parade

The New York City Saint Patrick's Day Parade is coming up soon, and NYC's parade is a really big deal. It's the oldest and largest St. Patrick's Day Parade in the world. The first NYC parade was held in 1762, and it's been a time-honored tradition of Irish pride ever since. From pipe and drum bands to dancers and performers in regalia, midtown Manhattan transforms into a big party with a sea of green revelers every year for this festive affair. More than 150,000 people march in the parade every year, with more than 2 million spectators cheering them on. The St. Patrick's Day Parade takes place on Saturday, March 16, 2024.

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"The Harlem Renaissance and Transatlantic Modernism" at The Met

The Harlem Renaissance had an indisputable impact on American culture, but chances are that you probably didn't spend much time learning about it in school. That's because, even though it shaped global literature, music, and art, Black Americans' historical contributions have been systematically erased or gone unacknowledged for centuries. A groundbreaking exhibit opening at the Metropolitan Museum of Art hopes to be a part of rectifying the erasure and celebrating Black artists and intellectuals in its newest exhibit. "The Harlem Renaissance and Transatlantic Modernism." The exhibit presents 160 works by Black artists from the Harlem Renaissance and delves into many different aspects of the movement, mostly through the lens of paintings and sculpture. 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JAPAN Fes

Eat your way through Japan without ever leaving New York City at JAPAN Fes, the massive foodie festival, which is back and bigger than ever for 2024. The organization is hosting 30 outdoor events this year stretching from March through November in Manhattan, Brooklyn, and Queens. Event organizers say it's the largest Japanese food festival in the world, attracting 300,000 visitors and featuring 1,000 vendors every year. Expect dishes including takoyaki, ramen, matcha sweets, yakisoba, karaage, okonomiyaki, and lots more. They're even hosting a ramen contest and a konamon contest this year to crown the best of the bunch. Vendors hail from New York City, as well as other states and other countries. The first JAPAN Fes of the season is on March 23 in the East Village.

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Brooklyn Paramount's reopening

A historic performance venue is on the brink of making history again with its reopening. Brooklyn Paramount will officially reopen on March 27, with a new capacity of 2,7000 guests following a multi-million dollar renovation of the 100-year-old space. The venue originally opened in 1928, as the world's first theater to show talking movies and a hotspot for world-famous performers. Now, for the first time in 60 years, the venue will be a hub for live music again. Here's more info on upcoming shows tickets.

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"Making Their Mark: Art by Women in the Shah Garg Collection"

When Komal Shah starting collecting art more than a decade ago, she noticed something startling: "The art world does not treat women artists equally" compared to male artists. She decided to do something about that by founding the Shah Garg Foundation with her husband, Gaurav Garg. The organization champions artwork by women and seeks to remedy the imbalances facing marginalized artists. Nearly 100 pieces of art from their collection are now on view in a powerful and diverse show called "Making Their Mark: Art by Women in the Shah Garg Collection" in Chelsea (548 West 22nd Street). It's free to visit through March 23, 2024; hours are Tuesday-Saturday, 11am-6pm.

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Well-Being Concerts at Carnegie Hall

Forget the gown, tux, and fancy shoes. For this new concert series at Carnegie Hall, stretchy pants, cozy sweaters, and comfy footwear is welcomed. The iconic venue is hosting five intimate concerts this winter that combine elements of mindfulness and meditation with world-class musical performances. These hour-long Well-Being Concerts cost between \$15-\$30 and run through April. During the show, audience members are encouraged to get comfortable while reclining on floor mats and cushions. A host will share prompts, lead breathing exercises, and ask guests to share thoughts and reflections with their fellow audience members. Guest may even be encouraged to sing. This month, bear from Grammy-nominated performer Nathalie Joachim who works in genres of pop, electronic, classical, and beyond. Tickets cost \$15 for the show on March 15.

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"World of AI·magination" at ARTECHOUSE

Inside a venue dating back 100 years into the past, a new art show explores a question of the future: How can human creativity and artificial intelligence coexist? ARTECHOUSE, located inside an old boiler room at Chelsea Market, has debuted its latest digital art exhibition, "World of AI·magination;" tickets are on sale here starting at \$21/person. To create the exhibition, ARTECHOUSE Studio developed original visual elements with generative AI systems. Designers hope to inspire visitors to consider AI as a "creative associate rather than a mere tool for innovation." World of AI·magination centers around a 20-minute cinematic experience with six scenes. One scene, called the Library of Magical Portals, features colossal books brimming with dreams and algorithms. Another scene called Symphony of Illusions constantly morphs, while the Infinite Maze immerses visitors into multiple parallels.

The annual Flamenco Festival makes its return to New York City this month with a commemoration of Spanish guitarists. The beloved event will run from March 1 through the 17, bringing a total of 22 performances across 13 different venues all over the city—from the New York City Center to Jazz at Lincoln Center and Town Hall, among others. For the uninitiated, flamenco is an extremely captivating Spanish style of music that heavily relies on the guitar and is also usually accompanied by a particular type of dancing and singing. You can look through the roster of shows right here, which includes "Invocation" at New York City Center, a production that features different pieces focusing on various styles of dance, from bolero to stylized and, of course, the purest form of flamenco.

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The Macy's Flower Show in NYC

Revel in forthcoming warm weather at the annual Macy's Flower Show. NYC will be budding with blooms all over, but nothing beats roaming the sweet-smelling foliage that suddenly appears at one of the city's best department stores: Macy's Herald Square. This year's show, created in partnership with Dior, runs from Sunday, March 24, to Sunday, April 7.
